Pastoral
Letter
Susan writes





January 2024

My dear friends,

As I write this letter, it is bitterly cold, with bright blue skies, and the threat (or promise) of snow across the north. And in that time of chilly days, we start to see the first flowers blossoming and we look towards spring and Easter. Before that of course we have the season of Lent.

In Lent we think about **Temptation**. Oscar Wilde claimed "I can resist everything except temptation" and Mae West said "I generally avoid temptation unless I can't resist it."

American comedian Robert Orben noticed that "what makes resisting temptation difficult for many people is they don't want to discourage it completely."

The language of temptation has been taken over by the advertising industry, which plays to the "naughty but nice" idea: the sense of doing something a little bit forbidden. Far from being seen as a failure if we give in to temptation, it's inevitable - desirable, even. Temptation is to be resisted just enough to make it more enjoyable when we eventually give in, and eat, buy, or do whatever it is that's been tempting us.

All of this is as much like real temptation as pink balloons and heart-shaped chocolates are like real love – which is quite apt this year, since Ash Wednesday, the start of Lent, is on 14th Feb!! Real temptation isn't about things we are unable to do, or don't want to do – I doubt anyone is tempted to ask the dentist for an extra filling, or HMRC for an extra tax return.

It's not about something we are "a bit partial to" in a "don't mind if I do" sort of way. We might talk about being tempted to another biscuit, or a few more minutes in bed, but really, we know it's not that big a deal.

Real temptation comes when part of us desperately wants to do something which the rest of us knows we must not. Real temptation makes us sweat. It hurts to resist. It feels as if it would be so much easier to give in.

In the season of Lent, we remember how Jesus faced real temptations in the wilderness at the start of his ministry. They boiled down to the temptation to be selfish, the temptation to grab power, and the temptation to superficial celebrity – all of which are just as much with us today. We can be sure that whatever temptations we are facing – the real ones that make us sweat and are so painful to resist – God knows all about them, first-hand.

And of course, if we do find ourselves defeated by temptation, we mustn't despair. Ultimately, what saves us is not our success or failure, but the strength and salvation of Jesus, who identified himself with us in this as in every other way, and defeated this enemy just as he defeated all others.

You might choose to give something up for Lent, or to start a new good habit. These things help us to remember that we are in a solemn season and to build a closer relationship with God.

We can mark Lent in other ways such as coming along to the Lent Lunches we offer in the church hall on Thursdays, or by joining one of our small groups (ask me for details) or in learning more about Christianity – there is an advert in this magazine for conversations about faith.

As we move away from Christmas and the Crib, and turn to face the cross of Good Friday and the eventual triumph of Easter, why not take one of these opportunities to explore your own spirituality this Lent?

JUNE

Join #30DaysWild. One of A Rocha UK's firm beliefs is that we are more likely to nurture and defend God's creation if we spend time enjoying it.

The Wildlife Trust's 30 Days Wild challenge is a great opportunity to engage with nature as an individual, household, or with your church community throughout June.

Taste the benefits of seasonal and local food. Plan to incorporate locally grown produce into your diet and shopping list throughout the seasons, as it is harvested at its peak ripeness, ensuring superior flavour compared to imported alternatives that have travelled thousands of miles. If saying grace before a meal is a regular practice in your household, this month, include giving thanks for your local food producers.

AUGUST

Assist local wildlife during hot weather.

Provide hedgehogs with a juicy snack like mealworms or canned dog food as their prey of slugs, snails and worms diminishes, and ensure a safe exit for them and other small mammals if you have a garden pond. Help garden birds by maintaining a filled bird bath and supplying supplementary food including black sunflower seeds, pinhead oatmeal,

soaked sultanas, raisins, currants, mealworms, waxworms, and a nutritious seed mixture, when natural supplies become scarce.

SEPTEMBER

Step outside this Season of Creation (1 September - 4 October).

Additionally, place foil or radiator panels to reflect heat into your room. Pray for those who might be experiencing the cold this winter.

DECEMBER

Unexpected youth club thriving in Gloucester

When Gloucester City deanery started focusing on new ways to engage with secondary-aged young people, they had no idea that within a year God would give them what they needed to start a thriving and expanding youth club.



At the start of 2023, Barrie Voyce, Senior Youth Connector for the Diocese of Gloucester, visited the deanery to help them think around ways to connect with youth and teenagers in their area. Together, they hit upon the idea of ensuring that the excellent relationships the church has with primary school children were not lost as they got older.

The deanery decided to prioritise being there for the Year 6s as they dealt with all the challenges of transition and ensuring that they had a safe space to meet with their friends.

Inspired by this idea, the Revd Rachel Beck, Vicar of Gloucester St George's Tuffley, paid particular attention to a couple of Year 6 children who came along to their church's family drop-in and attended the summer holiday club.

Led by Laine Lewis, ordinand on placement, the church invited them back for games, chat and doughnuts on Monday evenings in September.

The initial plan was to trial a group for four weeks, chat to the three or four children they had invited and see if there was an appetite to meet more often going forward.

Barrie says, "What started out as a simple conversation with the deanery about connecting with teens in our parishes has grown into something much bigger.

Showing these young people that the church cares about them and wants to provide for their needs has seen the group of young people grow and grow!

It is fascinating to see how God has worked through the personal invitation given to these children to speak to ever-growing numbers of young people."

Every week, more and more 11 to 14-year-olds turned up. The original group inviting their friends and those inviting more.

For an hour each Monday evening, the church hall is full of youth playing games, making things and chatting to the encouraged, if slightly surprised, volunteers.

Rachel says, "We have accidentally started a youth group! We are full of praise and thanksgiving to God for this, of course, and are very excited by it,

whilst also having a few challenges and questions about how to sustain it and help the young people as they develop in faith."

Susan's Sabbatical Part three – Good Habits

In November's magazine, I wrote about water, and in particular walking by water. In January, I wrote about music, especially singing. This month is my final report on my sabbatical, and it's about good habits. I learned a lot about myself on my sabbatical. I learned what things are important to my physical, mental and spiritual health. That's great, but of no use if I don't put it into practice.

I'm sure most of you have no idea what I do, as a vicar, day to day, week by week, but it is true to say that the job is not a job, but a vocation, and like many of you who are called to a vocation, it can take over your life. This is because we are passionate about what we do, and sometimes it doesn't even feel like work.

In fact, that is quite a problem, because sometimes when I am at an event that I enjoy, I forget that there is an emotional and physical price to pay, in terms of tiredness or lack of opportunity to spend time with family and so on. Just because I enjoy something, doesn't mean it's not work, and it still adds to the hours I spend in ministry.

As a result, I need to develop good habits to keep myself physically, mentally and spiritually well. There are some obvious things, such as taking my day off each week. I try to do this, although that can be tricky, as there are ministerial opportunities that only happen on Fridays

(my usual day off) and through December, there were several carol singing events on Fridays, and I didn't want to miss them.

I read a few books while on sabbatical. One of them was "Sabbath as Resistance" by Walter Brueggeman. Brueggeman talks about taking time out of our busy lives, to rest and pray, for all sorts of reasons. Some are simply about our health and the need to rest. Some are more radical and encourage us to stop working as resistance against the non-stop world we find ourselves living in nowadays.

I remember when shops were closed on Sundays. I didn't like it, but looking back, I can see that there is merit in this, not just for us as consumers, but also for shopworkers and everyone involved in retail.

In the bible, we are told that God created the world in six days and rested on the seventh. We might understand the creation story to be allegorical rather than literal, but the meaning of a day of rest is clear. God rested. We are made in the image of God. We need to rest.

Obviously, for vicars, Sunday is not a day of rest! It also isn't the busiest day of my week, but that's another story! So, taking another day off is important.

Also, working long hours says something about our self-esteem and our ego. Do I feel the need to work long hours to prove that I am a "good vicar" or that I am worth my wages? Or is my ego so inflated that I feel that I must do things, no one else can do them, and then leave no room for God to do God's work?

There is always more work to do. Some days are long because they really must be, but other days, I need to turn to those good habits, exercising, walking by water, finishing work at a sensible time in the evening, eating healthily, having a good sing, saying my prayers.

Apparently it takes four weeks for something to become a habit. At a time of year when resolutions are a thing, I didn't make any! I already have enough ideas for good habits. So, if you see me out walking, or if I say no to working on my day off – perhaps you can congratulate me on maintaining my good habits? I don't get it right all the time, but I will try, and I hope that you will try to look after yourself too. Resist the pressures of modern society to work so hard, be kind to yourself. I returned to work refreshed and ready to continue the work that I love in these parishes that I love. This is my last sabbatical report. I hope you have found them interesting. Thank you for reading them.

TIME MYSTERY AT HOLY TRINITY, BADGEWORTH

On the south east corner of Badgeworth church is a buttress which bears evidence of being moved or rebuilt at some time. The stone blocks are marked with simple Roman numerals 1, 11, III, and IV and although they appear to be laid in the correct ascending order, number III has been replaced upside down. How could we know that?

Apart from the clue given by the position of its number (relative to the others) stone III is also inscribed with a Scratch Dial, commonly used on churches from as far back as Saxon times, before the advent of clocks. Mass dials, as they are also known, usually take the form of a semi-circle with a hole at the centre and downward radiating lines extending to the circumference. A style, or gnomon, in the form of a simple peg would have been fixed in the style - hole and when the sun shone, the shadow passing over the scratch lines would mark the passing of time for mass. To cast a shadow on the Badgeworth dial, the sun would now have to shine from the ground! So, there' the clue —the dial is upside down and a stonemason was in error many years ago. We may never know when or why, but it does provide this church with an interesting curiosity.

A 'roper's undial generally shows all 12 hours of the day and markings are calculated to suit its exact, fitted location.

Unless it is a direct —south facing dial of the same latitude, a dial from one place will not show correct time in another. The gnomon which casts the shadow is angled to suit the particular latitude, and with practice the shadow can be read to tell the time with a fair degree of accuracy at any time of the year. Badgeworth Church has a fine example inscribed 'ohn Stanby his gift 1645' This can be seen 'resting' inside the church on a windowsill near the font. It appears to be a true south —facing dial and might have been fixed to the wall where the porch now stands —the subject of some future research? Scratch dials would have fallen into disuse over the centuries as more accurate methods of indicating time were developed. Proper sundials gradually came into use, and eventually (from the end of the 15th century) tower clocks began to appear on churches and important public buildings. 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
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
